Sinology (Chinese Studies) explores the basis of the traditional spirit of the Chinese nation, which is also the ground on which contemporary Chinese individuals cultivate their personal ethical duties and good relations within a harmonious society. Our main aim is to enhance the Greater China Region's (Hong Kong – Taiwan – Beijing) function as a Sinological exchange platform and transform it into a cultural forum for Sinologists around the world.

The Sinological Development Charitable Foundation was established by Dr. Elizabeth Woo Li to promote the study of Chinese Culture as an important part of a rising global civilization.

Summer Greater China Program in Chinese Studies aims at introducing Chinese studies to scholars and key opinion leaders from around the world who are in the disciplines other than Sinology.





ORGANIZATION STRUCTURE

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Hong Kong and Macao

Academic Introduction

The beginning of the program will take place in Hong Kong, the city with the largest number of English speaking scholars in Chinese Studies. The Program will take place at Chung Chi College of The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK), a key supporting partner to this Program. CUHK is a public research university in Shatin, Hong Kong, formally established in 1963 by a charter granted by the Legislative Council of Hong Kong.

Macau is an important part of Greater China, and its significance will be introduced. One of the highlights in our Macau session lies on the visit to University of Macau, the only public comprehensive university leading the academia of Macau.





Taiwan

Cultural Background

In Taiwan, where many authentic traditional customs, beliefs, and institutions have been preserved. Participants will be introduced to meditation and training methodologies of the Buddhist and Daoist origin in ancient Buddhist and Daoist temples.

During the Taiwan session lectures will be held at National Taiwan University (NTU), national co-educational research university. NTU is considered the most prestigious university in Taiwan





Beijing

Modernity

The last part of the program will be held at Peking University, the capital of China. The responses to the challenges of Buddhism and various other religious influences as well as the process of meeting the West in contemporary China will be introduced.

Program takes place at Peking University, which is a major Chinese research university and a member of the C9 League, founded in 1898 as a replacement of the ancient Taixue or Guozijian, or Imperial Academy. 24th World Congress of Philosophy will take place in Peking University, 13-20 August 2018.





THE XXIV WORLD CONGRESS OF PHILOSOPHY

Beijing

13 – 20 August, 2018

The World Congress of Philosophy is organized every five years by the International Federation of Philosophical Societies (FISP) in collaboration with one of its member societies. The XXIV World Congress will be held in Beijing, China, from August 13 to August 20, 2018, under the auspices of the Chinese Organizing Committee at the Peking University. The complementary aims of the 2018 Congress include an emphasis on exploring dimensions of the human and inquiring into the challenges facing humanity.

The Greater China Program aligns with the 24th World Congress of Philosophy in Beijing in 2018. Professional development in this program is specifically designed to help overseas (non-Chinese national) students, lecturers and professors to become familiar with Chinese studies in order to prepare to the XXIV World Congress of Philosophy, held in Beijing in 2018. A specific round table will be formed at this event to present distinguished papers.



Conception of Self in Classical Confucianism

Our group project is about the philosophical issue of self in Confucianism of Pre-Qin period. By analyzing the texts from Analects, Mencius and Xunzi, we will explore the questions that whether those masters have a common understanding about self or not; does Confucianism embrace the idea that one's self identity is exclusively constituted by social relationships, as proposed by scholars like Roger Ames, or has internal and transcendental dimension. Besides, we will also discuss the relationship between one's corporal existence and her moral and cognitive faculties; what role do they play in constituting one's conception of self.

Chinese Wisdom on the Ethics of International Humanitarian Intervention

The contemporary international order builds on its profound respect for sovereignty, which requires other countries not to intervene in another country's domestic affairs. However, sovereignty understood as such conflicts with the *transnational* moral duty to protect those people who suffer at the hands of their own governments. Attempting to shed light on this predicament in international relations, our group project draws on four Classical Chinese philosophical schools (Confucianism, Legalism, Mohism, and Daoism) to our aid. Our aim is to construct a uniquely Chinese response to this issue.

The Concept of Sagehood in Confucianism, Taoism and Buddhism

The project is dedicated to the problem of sagehood in three main teachings of China. Although the term "sage" (聖) is common for all of them, its content is evidently not the same, not only in particular characteristics, but also in functional aspect. As a result, we will accomplish a comparative research which would be helpful for defining the difference between self-cultivation theories of traditional China and having more clear understanding of the ideal person of each theory. In future our project can be broaden to another texts of three teachings in order to confirm our interim conclusions and make them more precise.


