## INFORMATION FOR PARTICIPANTS

Established in 2013 by Dr. Elizabeth Woo Li, **Sinological Development Charitable Foundation Limited (SDCF)** is a non-profit organization registered in Hong Kong. Our main aim is to help scholars around the world to further understand Chinese culture by offering relevant programs that will encourage them to integrate Chinese Studies into their own teaching and research.

Our **Greater China Summer Workshop Program in Chinese Studies** aims at introducing Chinese studies to international **scholars and key opinion leaders** who are in other disciplines.

**All instruction is conducted in English and a minimum standard is required for participation.**

## WAYS OF PARTICIPATION

### NON-SPONSORED PARTICIPATION

- Suggested donation for Hong Kong, Beijing, or other destinations: **1,000 HKD per location per day**
  - Suggested donation for **full** participation: **30,000 HKD**
- \*Other expenses (room and board, travel, etc.) are not included and should be managed by participants themselves*

### SPONSORED PARTICIPATION

SDCF will support a **limited number** of **sponsored** participants in the program. Sponsored participants are expected to integrate learning results into their teaching curriculum and research. Travel to Hong Kong at the beginning of the program and from the final destination back to Hong Kong at the end of the program needs to be arranged by the participants and is at their own expense. **Tuition, room, half board, and travel within Greater China are covered by SDCF.**

### ONLINE VIEWER MEMBERSHIP

Viewers can attend lectures and if time allows participate by submitting questions during the Q&A session at lectures (with the chat function). Viewers will not be able to attend the Group Workshop sessions.

## CONTRACTUAL AGREEMENT

Sponsored participants are required to sign an agreement as a prerequisite for admission. Full participation in all lectures, seminars, and activities and the completion of a small-scale research project on a topic related to the program contents are expected.

A payback scale will be included in the final agreement for participants who may not finish the 30-day program or participate in the activities and projects stipulated. All sponsored participants are to declare all illnesses, both physical and psychological, on the application form, and medical records or letters from doctors should be included with the application, where necessary.

A deposit may be required to grant access to the program.

## HONG KONG – The Classics and Neo-Confucianism

The program will commence in Hong Kong, the city with the largest number of English speaking scholars in Chinese Studies.

*The Book of Changes 《易經》, The Four Books 《四書》, other important Pre-Qin modes of thought, and Neo-Confucianism will be introduced.*

The Hong Kong session will take place at Chung Chi College of The Chinese University of Hong Kong, a key partner to the program.

## MACAU

Thanks to its Portuguese heritage, Macau acts as a strategic bridge between Greater China and Portuguese-speaking countries in the world.

The program includes a study visit to University of Macau, where participants will attend a lecture delivered by a member of the Faculty of Arts and Humanities. After the lecture, participants will be given free time to explore Macau's unique blend of Chinese and European architecture.

## BEIJING – Contemporary Confucianism and Daoist Philosophy and Practice

The second part of the program will take place in Beijing, where lectures at Peking University will focus on Daoist Philosophy and Contemporary Confucianism.

In Beijing, participants will also be introduced to meditation and self-cultivation techniques of the Daoist tradition through a practical workshop.
